A Music Sampler: Nashville to New Orleans

The Route From NASHVILLE, Tenn., drive 200 miles on I-40W to MEMPHIS; take I-55S to US-61S about 75 miles to CLARKSDALE, Miss.; stay on 61S for 216 miles to NATCHEZ and an additional 175 miles to NEW ORLEANS.

NASHVILLE Check in to the **Hermitage Hotel** (231 Sixth Ave. N., 888-888-9414 or thehermitagehotel.com), where Minnesota Fats lived and Gene Autry stayed when in town. Eat—and catch a live act—at the **Bluebird Cafe** (4104 Hillsboro Road, 615-383-1461 or bluebirdcafe.com), launching pad of singer Mary Chapin Carpenter. For the city's best meat-and-three, join the locals at **Elliston Place Soda Shop** (2111 Elliston Place, 615-327-1090). Save room for peanut-butter-and-banana Elvis cake at **Sweet 16th** (311 N. 16th St., 615-226-8367) in East Nashville. Johnny Cash's guitar, among other iconic memorabilia, is on show at the **Grand Ole Opry Museum** (2802 Opryland Drive, opry.com). See Elvis's solid-gold Cadillac at the **Country Music Hall of Fame and Museum** (222 5th Ave. S., countrymusichalloffame.com), and stroll the hand-and-foot-imprinted **Sidewalk of the Stars** (2515 McGavock Pike). Watch the likes of Roseanne Cash and Willie Nelson perform at country-music temple **Ryman Auditorium** (116 Fifth Ave. N., 615-254-1445 or ryman.com).

MEMPHIS Stay at the **Peabody Memphis** (149 Union Ave., 901-529-4000 or peabodymemphis.com), where pet ducks parade through the lobby morning and evening. The **Catfish Shack** (3706 S. Mendenhall Road, 901-366-6967) satisfies a fried-food fix; there's also Memphis-style BBQ at **Cozy Corner** (745 N. Parkway, 901-527-9158). Pay tribute to the King at **Graceland** (ticket office: 3765 Elvis Presley Blvd., 800-238-2000), Elvis Presley's 14-acre estate turned shrine. Tour **Sun Studio** (706 Union Ave., 800-441-6249), onetime recording home of Johnny Cash and Roy Orbison. Walk downtown's **Beale Street** (for live music venues, visit bealestreet.com or call 901-526-0110), and plumb the origins of American music at the **Memphis Rock 'n' Soul Museum** (191 Beale St., 901-205-2533). Then roll around the **Crystal Palace** skating rink (3364 S. 3rd St., 901-332-3900), site of scenes from indie flick *Hustle & Flow*.

CLARKSDALE There's a moon pie on your pillow at the **Shack Up Inn** (001 Commissary Circle, 662-624-8329 or shackupinn.com), a cluster of spiffed-up shotgun shacks with a new annex in a converted cotton mill.

Before dinner get your blues fix at the **Delta Blues Museum** (1 Blues Alley, deltabluesmuseum.org). A photo op awaits at the **Crossroads** (intersection of US-49 and US-61), where blues patriarch Robert Johnson allegedly sold his soul to the devil. For finger-lickin' eats hit **Abe's Bar-B-Q** (616 N. State St., 662-624-9947). Need a respite from road food? Reserve a table at Morgan Freeman's fancy **Madidi** (164 Delta Ave., 662-627-7770), then hit the actor's live-music lounge, **Ground Zero Blues Club** (0 Blues Alley, 662-621-9009), down the street. **SIDE TRIP:** Stop off in Greenville (about halfway between Clarksdale and Natchez) for steak and tamales at **Doe's Eat Place** (502 Nelson St., 662-334-3315).

NATCHEZ Stay in the city's historic heart at the **Natchez Eola Hotel** (110 Pearl St., 601-445-6000 or natchezeola.com). Eat like a local at **Cock of the Walk** (200 N. Broadway, 601-446-8920), where cornmeal-crusted catfish and coleslaw are specialties. Tipple with the townsfolk too on the riverbanks at **Under the Hill Saloon** (25 Silver St., 601-446-8023). In October the weekend-long **Great Mississippi River Balloon Race** features performances by some of the nation's best musicians (natchezballoonrace.com). **SIDE TRIP:** Take Hwy. 65W about 12 miles to Ferriday, La., once the home of cousins Mickey Gilley, Jimmy Swaggart and Jerry Lee Lewis, whose sister Frankie Jean lives in and gives tours of the **Jerry Lee Lewis Museum and Liquor Store** (712 Louisiana Ave., 318-757-2460).

NEW ORLEANS Top off the trip at the romantic **Soniat House** (1133 Chartres St., 800-544-8808) in the French Quarter. Near Jackson Square, **Central Grocery** (923 Decatur St., 504-523-1620) sells muffulettas big enough to share. Choose among the foodie trinity—**Galatoire's** (209 Bourbon St., 504-525-2021), **Commander's Palace** (1403 Washington Ave., 504-899-8221) and **Brennan's** (417 Royal St., 504-525-9713)—for classic creole cuisine. Off the beaten path, **Mother's Restaurant** (401 Poydras St., 504-523-9656 or mothersrestaurant.net) serves up prime po'boys and "debris" sandwiches (filled with the bits of meat that fall into the gravy during roasting). **Preservation Hall** (726 St. Peter St., 504-522-2841) upholds tradition with no-frills, no-seats Dixieland jazz; for zydeco, Cajun and other local genres, hit **Tipitina's** (501 Napoleon Ave., 504-895-8477), or bowl while you boogie at **Midcity Lanes Rock 'n Bowl** (4133 S. Carrollton Ave., 504-482-3133). —Caren Weiner Campbell



Antiquing and Americana: A Midwestern Tour

The Route From DETROIT, take I-96W 43 miles to ANN ARBOR, Mich. Continue on I-96W to I-196W about 150 miles to HOLLAND. Take I-196E to US-131N for 169 miles to TRAVERSE CITY. Continue on US-31N to I-75N for 119 miles to the Cheboygan Ferry to MACKINAC ISLAND. Return to the mainland, take I-75N to US-2W to US-41S to MARQUETTE, Mich. (199 miles total). Take US-41W to US-2 to I-35N to DULUTH, Minn. (200 miles), then pick up I-35S to US-2W to BEMIDJI. Drive south via Minn. Rte. 64, US-10 and I-94S to MINNEAPOLIS (220 miles total).

DETROIT Make yourself at home at the **Inn on Ferry Street** (84 E. Ferry St., 313-871-6000 or innonferrystreet.com), a cluster of handsome Victorians and carriage houses, before tucking into New American cuisine at the highly regarded **Whitney** (4421 Woodward Ave., 313-832-5700), housed in a restored 19th-century mansion. Trace the Motor City's history through its music with a self-guided tour of the most famous jazz, blues, gospel and, of course, Motown sites (visitdetroit.com for itineraries). Drive past the city's monument to its former position as tire-manufacturing capital of the US: The giant Uniroyal tire now on I-94 starred in the 1964 World's Fair in N.Y.C.

ANN ARBOR Load up on gourmet road food—or stop for a picnic lunch—at legendary **Zingerman's Delicatessen** (422 Detroit St., 734-663-3354), near the town's farmers market. One weekend each month (April–November) the **Washtenaw Farm Council Grounds** (5055 Ann Arbor Saline Road, 937-875-0808 or annarborantiquesmarket.com) is the gathering place for a giant collectibles market, offering everything from Americana to art deco pieces.

HOLLAND Rooms at the **Hunter's Lodge** in nearby Saugatuck (2790 Blue Star Highway, 269-857-5402 or thehunterslodge.com) bear a tongue-in-cheek resemblance to log cabins; the two-room full suite even has its own private garden. Chow down on Butter Burgers and frozen custard at regional fast-food fave **Culver's** (3035 W. Shore Drive, 616-399-8475). The **Dutch Village** theme park (12350 James St., 800-285-7177) features clog dancers, cheese makers and an old-time swing ride. At **Windmill Island** (7th St. at Lincoln Ave., 616-355-1030), a 240-year-old working windmill overlooks gardens, a replica of a 14th-century Dutch inn, and an antique carousel. Sip a phosphate at the bona fide 1950s soda fountain inside the **Saugatuck Drugstore** (20 Butler St., 269-857-2300). SIDE TRIP: The half-hour drive south on US-131 to Fennville is worth every minute for a taste of the offerings at **Crane's Pie Pantry** (6054 124th Ave., 269-561-2297).

TRAVERSE CITY Spend the night at **Ranch Rudolf** (6841 Brown Bridge Road, 231-947-9529 or ranchrudolf.com), where the simple rooms are no-frills and the on-site activities include archery, horseshoes, bird watching, trail rides, canoeing and Ping-Pong. Wake up to a “breakfast bobby,” a Cornish pasty, at **Cousin Jenny's** (129 S. Union, 231-941-7821). Since Traverse City is the nation's cherry capital, indulge in a cherry milkshake at **Don's Drive-In** (2030 US-31N, 231-938-1860), where folks have savored the burgers since 1958. Traverse City teems with antiques shops—as do neighboring Suttons Bay and Northport—many emphasizing Americana (visittraversecity.com for listings). In July don't miss the National Cherry Festival; August travelers may find themselves in town for the annual film festival, sponsored by Michael Moore (231-392-1134 for info). SIDE TRIP: Foodies should make the 40-mile drive north to Ellsworth for a stop at **Tapawingo** (9502 Lake St., 231-588-7971), possibly the Midwest's finest restaurant.

MACKINAC ISLAND Three ferry lines ply the waters; the ride takes less than 20 minutes. You'll need to leave your car in long-term parking—only emergency vehicles are allowed on the island (horse-drawn carriages and

bicycles are preferred transportation). Book a room at the **Grand Hotel** (800-334-7263 or grandhotel.com), an iconic symbol of the island itself. Don your best to dine there or at the Iroquois Hotel's **Carriage House** (906-847-3321). More casual options: the **Yankee Rebel Tavern** (1493 Astor St., 906-847-6249) and **Patrick Sinclair's Irish Pub** (7304 Main St., 906-847-8255). When you're not cycling around taking in the Victorian architecture, visit the Revolutionary-era **Fort Mackinac** and historic downtown. Stock up on the island specialty at **Murdick's Fudge** (110 Huron St., 906-847-3530) before ferrying back to the mainland.

MARQUETTE Sleep in the **Big Bay Point Lighthouse Bed and Breakfast** (3 Lighthouse Road, 906-345-9957), a working beacon located 26 miles north of town via Hwy. 550. Cornish pasties, offered at shops throughout the Upper Peninsula, are the pièce de résistance. Other noshing: **Gustafson's Smoked Fish and Beef Jerky** (4321 US-2, 906-292-5424) in Brevort for to-go snacks and the **Vierling Restaurant** (119 S. Front, 906-228-3533) for a sit-down dinner and house-made brew. Stroll through the **Seney National Wildlife Refuge** (1674 Refuge Entrance Road, 906-586-9851), or kayak and wreck-dive along the **Pictured Rocks National Lakeshore** (906-387-3700) in nearby Munising. July is the month for the **Hiawatha Music Festival** (906-226-8575 or hiawathamusic.org) in Marquette, and in August there's the **Upper Peninsula State Fair** (2401 12th Ave. N., 906-786-4011) in Escanaba, a short detour south on US-41.

DULUTH View Lake Superior from a room at **Fitger's Inn** (600 E. Superior St., 218-722-8826 or fitgers.com), a converted brewery that's now on the National Register of Historic Places. The **New London Cafe** (4721 E. Superior St., 218-525-0777) does diner-eats right. You can satisfy your sweet tooth at **Amazing Grace Bakery & Cafe** (394 S. Lake Ave., 218-723-0075) in Canal Park, then walk it all off on the three-mile **Lakewalk** (Canal Park Drive, 218-722-4011) along Superior's shore. Harborside, there's the Canal Park island and entertainment district. SIDE TRIP: **Betty's Pies** (33 Hwy. 61, 218-834-3367), in Two Harbors, is worth the half-hour drive north of Duluth.

BEMIDJI Get cozy at **Taber's Historic Log Cabins** (2404 Bemidji Ave. N., 218-751-5781 or taberslogcabins.com)—they date from the thirties and are outfitted with handmade furniture. Fortify yourself with loose-meat sandwiches and pie at **Maid-Rite** (1602 Bemidji Ave., 218-444-7224) before browsing the dozen-plus antiques shops in town. Check out the 18-foot-tall **Paul Bunyan** statue, with a companion statue of **Babe the Blue Ox** (300 Bemidji Ave., 218-759-0164), standing next to the Bemidji Visitors and Convention Bureau building. The Buena Vista Ski Area (19276 Lake Julia Drive N.W., 800-777-7958 or bvskiarea.com) offers covered wagon rides with scenic views of the **Continental Divide**. In late July there's the **Beltrami County Fair** (218-444-8169), featuring chicken races and a paint-the-pig contest along with the standard livestock, produce and home-arts exhibits.

MINNEAPOLIS Cap off your trip with a stay at the romantic and secluded **Nicollet Island Inn** (95 Merriam St., 612-331-1800 or nicolletislandinn.com), on an island in the Mississippi River in the heart of the city. Treat yourselves to the lamb scottadito at **112 Eatery** (112 N. Third St.; 612-343-7696), the city's “it” reservation and anointed chef hangout. Hit **Al's** (413 14th Ave. S.E., 612-331-9991) in Dinkytown for breakfast or **Matt's Bar** (3500 Cedar Ave. S., 612-722-7072) for Juicy Lucys (burgers with melted cheese inside) afterward. Browse the **Walker Art Center and Sculpture Garden** (1750 Hennepin Ave., walkerart.org) or join the crowd at that most American place, the **Mall of America** in Bloomington (at the crossroads of I-494 and Hwy. 77, 952-883-8800 or mallofamerica.com). —Caren Weiner Campbell

Man-Made and Natural Wonders: Las Vegas to Yellowstone National Park

The Route From LAS VEGAS, take I-15N and Utah Rte. 9 for about 160 miles to reach ZION NATIONAL PARK. For BRYCE CANYON NATIONAL PARK, continue on Rte. 9 to US-89N to Utah Rte. 12. Get on US-89N to I-70E for about 280 miles to MOAB. Head northwest on US-191, US-6 and I-15N for about 235 miles to SALT LAKE CITY. Follow I-15N about 160 miles to US-26E, Idaho Rte. 31 and Wyo. Rte. 22 for another 90 miles to JACKSON, Wyo. Take the Grand Teton National park roads and US-191 for about 55 miles to YELLOWSTONE NATIONAL PARK.

LAS VEGAS Shack up in Sin City's current celebrity central, the **Palms** (4321 W. Flamingo Road, 866-942-7777 or palms.com), and head to one of the hotel's star-studded restaurants: **N9ne Steakhouse** (702-933-9900) serves world-class filets and rib eyes in a sleek room, while the French menu at more formal **Alizé** (702-942-7777) is worth the splurge for its city views. At **Aureole** (Mandalay Bay, 3950 Las Vegas Blvd. S., 702-632-7401), enjoy New American cuisine among the "wine angels," who bungee-bounce to get your bottle. Hit the dance floor at Janet Jackson fave **Tao** (the Venetian, 3355 Las Vegas Blvd. S., 702-388-8588) or at Hollywood starlet hangout **Pure** (Caesars Palace, 3570 Las Vegas Blvd., 702-731-7873). Cruise the **Strip** (Las Vegas Blvd. S.) at night. Play the tables at the **Venetian** (3355 Las Vegas Blvd. S., 702-414-1000), then see the huge sound-and-light extravaganza at the **Fremont Street Experience** (425 Fremont St. at Las Vegas Blvd., 702-678-5777) or the outdoor fountain show at the **Bellagio** (3600 Las Vegas Blvd. S.).

ZION AND BRYCE CANYON NATIONAL PARKS Sleep in a tepee outfitted with Navajo rugs, Pendleton blankets and cushy floor mats or cots at the **Utah Trails Resort** (12121 W. Hwy. 9, 800-871-6811, utahtrailsresort.com). In nearby Springdale, drink microbrews with the locals on the porch at the **Bit & Spur** (1212 Zion Park Blvd., 435-772-3498). Take in the trippy rock formations—Kolob Arch and Double Pine Arch are among the most famous—in **Zion National Park**, and keep an eye out for condors, desert tortoises and bighorn sheep. Drive a couple of hours farther northeast along US-89 and Utah Rte. 12 to reach **Bryce Canyon**. The park is packed with skinny, colorful limestone columns known as hoodoos (some as tall as 150 feet) with monikers such as the Hunter, Queen Victoria and Thor's Hammer.

MOAB Glimpse a view of the river and red rocks from the porch of your cabin at the **Sorrel River Ranch Resort and Spa** (Hwy. 128, Mile 17, 877-359-2715 or sorrelriver.com). Eat at the ranch's highly regarded **Sorrel River Grill** or tuck into a double-cut cowboy pork chop at **Buck's Grill House** (1393 N. US-191, 435-259-5201). Breakfast is served all day long at the **Moab Diner** (189 S. Main St., 435-259-4006). Drive through the Island in the Sky district (a mesa atop 1,000-foot cliffs) in **Canyonlands National Park** (nps.gov/cany) to see panoramic views of the rock formations below. Native American art covers the rock walls of **Horseshoe Canyon** and at nearby **Arches National Park** (nps.gov/arch),

home to more than 2,000 unearthly sandstone bridges and outcroppings like the Three Gossips, the Spectacles and the Fiery Furnace.

SALT LAKE CITY Converted from a 1924 bank, the **Hotel Monaco** (15 W. 200 South, 801-595-0000 or monaco-saltlakecity.com) has hosted Faith Hill and Janet Jackson. Pull the car into **Hires Big H** (400 South 700 East, 801-364-4583), order up burgers and root beer, and eat them off a tray hung from your car window. Or indulge in the gourmet preparations at rustic, removed and romantic restaurant **Log Haven** (6451 E. 3800 South, 801-272-8255 or log-haven.com). Stroll Temple Square, especially the recently refurbished, architecturally grand **Tabernacle** (50 W. South Temple, 801-240-2534) and the Mormon church's **Family History Library** (35 N. West Temple, 801-240-2584), the world's largest genealogical archive. Bike or drive along the Great Salt Lake on a seven-mile causeway to nearby **Antelope Island** and float effortlessly atop the dense water at **Bridger Bay**. **SIDE TRIPS:** North of the city, off I-15, is the **Golden Spike National Historic Site** (near Brigham City, 435-471-2209); travel the 15.5-mile dirt road southwest from there to visit artist Robert Smithson's **Spiral Jetty**. Drive 90 miles east from the city along I-80 to visit the **Bonneville Salt Flats**, which stretch over 30,000 acres, where race-car drivers set land-speed records.

JACKSON Tuck yourself in at the very private **Spring Creek Ranch** (1800 Spirit Dance Road, 800-443-6139 or springcreekranch.com), located in a wildlife sanctuary. Start the day with a plate of sourjacks (sourdough pancakes) at **Jedediah's House of Sourdough** (135 E. Broadway, 307-733-5671), in a small antique cabin near downtown Jackson. Calista Flockhart and Harrison Ford like **Teton Thai** (135 N. Cache St., 307-733-0022), but for more characteristic local eats, pull up to a plate of ribs at **Bubba's Bar-B-Que** (515 W. Broadway, 307-733-2288). Scope out the glacial lakes and stunning canyons—not to mention the moose, elk, otters and beavers—at **Grand Teton National Park** (nps.gov/grte), where you can fish from the banks of the Snake River or hike along the shore of Jenny Lake to Hidden Falls and Inspiration Point. Drive up Signal Mountain Summit Road for spectacular panoramas at Jackson Point.

YELLOWSTONE NATIONAL PARK Get up close to the park's most famous geyser in a room at the rustic **Old Faithful Inn** (866-439-7375). Stock up on picnic essentials at **Ernie's Deli & Bakery** (US-20, 406-646-9467). Book a reservation to ride a horse or covered wagon to the **Old West Dinner Cookout** at Roosevelt Lodge (307-344-7311). Not a meat eater? Order the pan-fried rainbow trout or walleye at **Bullwinkle's Saloon & Eatery** (19 Madison Ave., 406-646-7974). In addition to Old Faithful, there's no shortage of natural wonders to admire in the park: the Lower Falls, enormous Yellowstone Lake, Mammoth Hot Springs, Tower Falls, the Lower Geyser Basin with its steaming fumaroles and vividly colored Fountain Paint Pots, and the Norris Geyser Basin, which has boardwalks for strolling. —Caren Weiner Campbell

Food Lovers in the Pacific Northwest: Seattle to Vancouver Island

The Route From SEATTLE, get on I-5N, which becomes US-99 at the Canadian border (Don't forget your passport!). Drive for about 2½ hours to reach VANCOUVER. Board the ferry, car and all, at Tsawwassen terminal (bcferries.com) to Swartz Bay on VANCOUVER ISLAND. Get on Hwy. 17S to VICTORIA, then take the Transcanada Highway (Hwy. 1N) about 2 hours; at the Nanaimo Bypass, it changes to Hwy. 19. Continue on Hwy. 19 to Hwy. 4W, which ends in a T-stop, from which you can turn north to the secluded beach town of TOFINO or south to get to UCLUELET.

SEATTLE Stay downtown at the **Hotel Max** (620 Stewart St., 866-833-6299 or hotelmaxseattle.com), the coffee capital's art hotel. First stop: **Pike Place Market** (park at 1531 Western Ave.), where artisanal foods fill the stalls and restaurants line the street. Get your fill of cured meat at Mario Batali's dad's place, **Salumi** (309 Third Ave. S., 206-621-8772; open till mid-afternoon), and don't miss **Top Pot Doughnuts** in Capitol Hill (609 Summit Ave. E., 206-323-7841) or downtown (2124 Fifth Ave., 206-728-1966). Also downtown, **Palace Kitchen** (2030 Fifth Ave., 206-448-2001) is a foodie favorite, as is its fancier sibling, **Dahlia Lounge** (2001 4th Ave., 206-682-4142). Then give your belly a break, and take the elevator to the top of the **Space Needle** for panoramic views of the city.

VANCOUVER Book a room at the **Opus Hotel** (322 Davie St., 866-642-6787 or opushotel.com), where the swank **Opus Bar** is the city's see-and-be-seen hot spot. Jennifer Garner and Alicia Silverstone have each dined at the hotel's chic bistro, **Elixir**. Down by historic Gastown's gritty railyards, the **Alibi Room** fills for dinner every night with trend-setters. Reserve a table at **Go Fish** (1504 W. 1st Ave., 604-730-5040) in Kitsilano. Some of the best Indian food on the West Coast is at **Vij's** (1480 W. 11th Ave., 604-736-6664). Stroll **Sunset Beach** (Beach Ave. between Thurlow and Bute streets) or clothing-optional **Wreck Beach**

(604-856-9598 or wreckbeach.org). Browse along the streets of charming **Gastown**, and take in **Chinatown**, second in size to San Francisco's version.

VICTORIA, VANCOUVER ISLAND Sleep in grand style at the landmark **Fairmont Empress** (721 Government St., 250-384-8111 or fairmont.com/empress), where the hotel's high tea is a highlight. Asian eateries abound; among the best is **J & J Wonton Noodle House** (1012 Fort St., 250-383-0680). **Paprika Bistro** (2524 Estevan Ave., 250-592-7424) is a local favorite for Hungarian cuisine. If you're seeking fancier fare, *Zagat Survey* rates Rosemeade at the **English Inn and Resort** (429 Lampson St., 250-388-4353) one of the best on the island. Not to be missed: vanilla-and-fresh-strawberry Canada Cones sold on downtown street corners. Among the sights, tour Victorian-era **Craigdarroch Castle** (1050 Joan Crescent, 250-592-5323), stroll the **Butchart Gardens** (800 Benvenuto Ave., 866-652-4422), or pack a picnic and head to **Beacon Hill Park** (east of Douglas St., south of Southgate). **SIDE TRIP:** In nearby Sooke, the elegant menu at **Sooke Harbour House** (1528 Whiffen Spit Road, 250-642-3421) features locally grown and produced ingredients—some plucked right on the premises.

WESTERN VANCOUVER ISLAND In Tofino stay at the **Wickaninnish Inn** (at the end of Osprey Lane, 800-333-4604 or wickinn.com), choice of Susan Sarandon and Alanis Morissette. In Ucluelet book a beachfront cabin at Jason Priestley's **Terrace Beach Resort** (1002 Peninsula Road, 250-726-2901 or terracebeachresort.ca). Locals love the eats from the purple lunch truck **SoBo** (1084 Pacific Rim Highway, 250-725-2341 or sobo.ca) in the Tofino Botanical Gardens. Dine by the water at the **Boat Basin** (1971 Harbour Dr., 250-726-4625), or for the most romantic finale, take in the views of the Pacific—not to mention fresh fish, oysters and lobster bisque—at the Wick Inn's **Pointe**. —Caren Weiner Campbell
